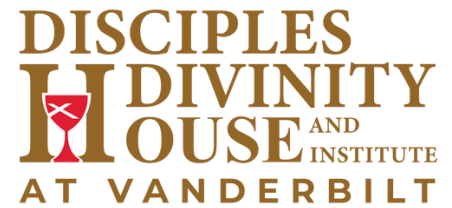

Greetings for the New Year & Welcome to Our Quarterly Newsletter

It is with deep gratitude and great joy that I welcome you to the inaugural quarterly newsletter of Disciples Divinity House and Institute (DDHI). This newsletter is our shared community space. This is a place for current students, alumni, and friends to stay connected, to learn more about what is happening at the House, and to remain rooted in a community that is both distinctive and deeply committed to faith, justice, and formation.

This year marks an exciting new chapter in our life together as we officially launch the Institute. The DDHI Institute is a learning hub designed for students, alumni, lay leaders, and local congregations who are eager to engage theological education through a social justice lens. It is also for lay leaders and everyday people who desire to deepen their understanding of what it means to live as Christians in the world today.

DDHI's renewed vision centers on deepening relationships through service and shared leadership. As an Institute, we serve as a dynamic resource hub for pastoral care and leadership formation, committed to nurturing call, sustaining faith, and supporting leaders across every stage of their vocational journey.

Grounded in an ecumenical spirit and shaped by the values of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ), DDHI serves students, clergy, lay leaders, and congregations through collaborative partnerships with Vanderbilt University, the Christian Church in Tennessee, and congregations in Nashville and beyond. Together, we are cultivating denominational and ecumenical spaces for discernment, growth, care, and courageous leadership for the church and for the world.

As we build this next chapter, we invite you to join us in prayer and to support this work by registering for an upcoming workshop. In order to expand our reach and deepen our impact, the Institute will offer hybrid learning opportunities, gathering both virtually and in person.

Faculty Spotlight

Dr. Yara González-Justiniano

Dr. González-Justiniano is an Assistant Professor of Religion, Psychology, and Culture with an emphasis on Latinx Studies at Vanderbilt University. Her scholarly work focuses on practical theology, with a particular interest in the intersections of land, ecology, and social justice. In her book *Centering Hope as a Sustainable Decolonial Practice*, Dr. González-Justiniano explores how hope can serve as a transformative force within decolonial and theological frameworks.

Her current research challenges readers to reflect on the relationship between people and place, especially through the theological questions posed by Marlene Ferreras and Randy Woodley: “What grows in your land?” and “How do you take care of the land?” These inquiries invite a deeper engagement with ecological justice and our role in sustaining the earth.



Dr. González-Justiniano is also working on her second monograph, *Exhausting All Possibilities: Healing in Place*, which addresses the trauma of displacement caused by environmental, socioeconomic, and military forces. Drawing from trauma studies and ritual theory, she explores how healing can emerge from the fractured relationships created by forced migration, offering a vision for integrative healing that touches on the personal, communal, and ecological aspects of human experience.

Rev. Lanza, Fort Worth, TX, a 2008 graduate, is the Co-Founder and Executive Director of Be The Neighbor (www.betheneighbor.org). Additionally, my Vanderbilt education at the School of the Prophets provided me with the skills and knowledge to face the challenges of our world with courage, to speak out for God's justice in both words and actions, and to recognize that I am not alone in this work, but stand in the tradition of faithful justice seekers striving to build the beloved community. I cannot imagine my ministry without the community and education I received at Vanderbilt and in the House, and I am committed to ensuring that this opportunity remains available for those answering their call today.

Disciples Discernment Retreat – Applications Now Open

What does it look like to take your questions of faith, justice, and vocation seriously - and not alone?

The Disciples Discernment Retreat is a weekend experience for Disciples who are curious about theological education and vocational discernment. Designed for young adults ages 19-26, this retreat creates space to ask honest questions about calling, ministry, justice, and faith without pressure or pretense. This event is made possible through partnerships with Disciples Divinity House and Institute, Disciples Home Missions, Disciples Peace Fellowship, Be The Neighbor, and Vanderbilt Divinity School Admissions, with a sponsorship from the Oreon E. Scott Foundation.

Participants will engage in spiritual discernment practices, conversation with Vanderbilt Divinity School faculty and students, practical discussions about theological education, admissions, and financial aid, as well as get the opportunity to see the work in action on site visits. Rooted in radical hospitality, community, and joy, this retreat offers tangible resources and life-giving connections for those exploring what might be next.

Whether you are feeling drawn toward ministry, theological study, or simply wondering how faith and vocation intersect, this weekend is an invitation to pull up a chair and discern together.

We invite you to apply or to nominate someone who may benefit from this experience. We encourage you to share this opportunity and help spread the word. Applications and nominations are now open, space is limited, and all costs are covered.

Rev. Cherisna Jean-Marie is a Haitian-American leader, preacher, and justice advocate, born and raised in Newark, New Jersey. She is the newly elected Dean of the Disciples Divinity House at Vanderbilt, becoming the first woman and person of color to serve in this role, beginning April 1, 2024.

A trailblazer in ministry and social justice, she has held several historic leadership positions across faith-based and nonprofit institutions. She is the founder of The Co-Conspirator Institute, a nonprofit dedicated to confronting systemic racism and fostering healing from racial trauma, including grief retreats for Black mothers impacted by gun violence.

An award-winning preacher and co-contributor to multiple book projects, Rev. Jean-Marie is also a mentor, community organizer, and international teacher who proudly embraces her most cherished role as “auntie” to her nieces and nephews.



Angela Jones

Angela Y. Jones is a seasoned community service professional with more than 30 years of experience in healthcare access, education, youth development, and organizational leadership. She currently serves as House Administrator at Disciples Divinity House and Institute at Vanderbilt, overseeing daily operations and supporting a residential community of theological graduate students.
